Product Description: The Conjointly All-In-One Survey Research Platform is used for all types of B2C and B2B research, with the strongest expertise focusing on product and pricing research.

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Evaluation Methods Used: The evaluation of accessibility on the respondent-facing pages are conducted with manual and automated testing. Manual testing was performed using Google Chrome 135, NVDA 2024.4.2, Windows 11 24H2. Only respondent-facing pages were evaluated.

Automated testing was performed using axe DevTools - Web Accessibility Testing 4.103.8 plug-in.
